I really enjoy co-leading our membership classes. At the beginning of each class, we ask attendees to tell us why they are interested in becoming members. I am constantly moved and encouraged as people respond with stories that reflect our identified priorities: Jesus centred. People focused.

For example, one membership class attendee shared that after their kids' first experience in our youth ministry, they came home and reported excitedly, "They really love Jesus there." We are Jesus centred. We want everyone who encounters our church to have the same report.

This past year, our Youth and Young Adult Ministries reflected this priority by having students read through Luke together and share their insights in their small groups. Our Kids Ministry and the rest of the church joined them after Easter to read and study through Acts. Men and women in their 70s, 60s, 50s, 40s, 30s, 20s, as well as teens and children begin to fellowship and learn alongside each other. Teens and adults teach children together, older children help younger children find scripture in their Bible or team up to play fun activities and help each other to be successful. In the nursery, older adults teach teens how to care for babies and toddlers and those same babies and toddlers bless those that are older with their joyful play and sweet hugs. In the midst of all this activity, quiet conversation takes place. "How has your week been?" "That must be hard." "I will be praying about that." "How did your trip go?" "How did you do on that big test you had last week?" The sound of intergenerational friendships growing and building! What a blessing it is to be able to hear stories from someone who has journeyed life before you. What a blessing it is to hear what our youth are struggling with today and to be able to pray with and for them. A perfect example of this is Terry, who is in her 70s and Ashley, who is 16. Several months ago, they began to be scheduled together in nursery and today, they call each other friend. As you pass by the nursery you will hear them talking about anything from Terry sharing a life experience she learned from to the details of a dress that Ashley bought for a special event. What a blessing it is for Terry and Ashley and what a blessing it is for Ashley's parents to know that another adult cares so much for their daughter and is speaking wisdom and truth into her life. We are blessed in this church community with so many people at different ages and stages of life.



There is so much to be critical about when it comes to our generational differences, but...there are also so many ways that we can learn from each other and grow from what each other knows and experiences in life. "As iron sharpens iron, so one person sharpens another." (Proverbs 27:17) We need each other as we travel through the ups and downs of life in community.
